## Introducing the concept of EXTENDED MATE

In chess, sometimes it is not enough to simply win a game. It's a disrespect, but if the adversary understimates the opponent's ability, insisting to keep on a clearly lost position without abandoning it, one needs to make him suffer, torturing him to the extreme, to see his affliction when he gradually finds out there is no escape for his king. If he likes to be tortured, be my guest! Greater than the pleasure of winning is the cruel satisfaction of a slow and painful death of the opposing monarch, step by step tearing off his skin, staining the board with blood, without haste for the final blow.

The below composition was elaborated by the enthusiast Eduardo Esber, P4R website editor. Introducing the concept of Extended Mate, it perfectly illustrates what the pleasure of torture is, for those who request it, of course. The hurried would mate in 1, 2 or at most 3 moves. The meek would give a mate in 4 , but why to placate a game with a mate in 4 , when we can offer more pain with a mate in 5 ? And what is the reason for a mate in 5 when we can offer even more suffering and mate in 6 ? Wouldn't it be more convenient to enjoy the other's despair and mate in 7? And what about enjoying a desperate King's groans when delivering a mate in 8 ? Perhaps it is more interesting to see the blood gush and culminate it with a mate in 9 . Or, nothing better than offering a ticket to hell and give mate in 10! All of this illustrates the concept and objectives of an Extended Mate. In a game, for those who insist on not resigning a lost game, cruelty never hurts.


## PROBLEM:

$\gg$ White to play and mate in 1 and give Extended Mate in 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 e 10.
>> Optionally, Black to play and mate in 1 and, ignoring White's 2.Kxh2 move after the Knight check, give Extended Mate in 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10.

## SOLUTION:

There are many beautiful and well-designed lines, but we will illustrate just a few. With some reasoning, new lines can be deciphered for the same number of moves or more, and the torture can be prolonged, with Extended Mate in 11, 12, 13, 14 and beyond... No mercy!
